Please read this material carefully, and in full, as information you are interested in may not be only in one section! For example: if you are interested in environmental fellowships, there is an environmental section. Programs in the policy area or in international development might also be applicable. Programs are listed alphabetically under each of the sections outlined below.

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National and International Policy:

American-Scandinavian Foundation

ASF is a publicly supported, nonprofit organization that promotes international understanding through education and cultural exchange with Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden. Applicants must have a well-defined research or study project that makes a stay in Scandinavia essential. Must be US citizens and have completed a BA degree. Awards range from Grants (normally \$3,000) to Fellowships (up to \$18,000).

California Executive Fellowship Program

The program accepts 18 college graduates to serve in staff positions in the Governor's Office, in the offices of Constitutional Officers, and throughout the various agencies and departments of the executive branch. Fellows attend seminars, review current scholarship on the Californian State Government, and fulfill the duties expected of employees in state service. Must be a US citizen and either a recent college graduate, a student in an advanced degree program or a mid-career professional. Fellows receive a monthly stipend along with health benefits. An MPA student received this fellowship in 1998-99.

California Judicial Administration Fellowship Program

The Judicial Administration Fellowship Program is a professional development, university graduate and career preparation program designed to provide participants with direct experience in the judicial branch of the California government. The CSUS Center for California Studies invites applications from persons of all academic disciplines with an interest in judicial administration issues, policies and the day-to-day operations of the courts. Fellows are assigned to field placements in Sacramento, Oakland and San Francisco. Must possess either a graduate or an undergraduate degree. Fellows receive a stipend of ~\$1,882/month and can earn twelve units of graduate credit in the field of public policy and administration.

Carnegie Council on Ethics & International Affairs Fellowship Program

Fellowships will link individual research projects to ongoing Carnegie Council projects. Areas for research include: human rights, environmental values, conflict prevention, justice & the world economy, history, memory & reconciliation, and curriculum development in ethics & international affairs. Younger scholars, mid-career professional and those from developing countries are encouraged to apply. All fellows must be fluent in English.

The Central European University Center for Policy Studies/Open Society Institute International Policy Fellowships

The CPS International OSI Policy Fellowships are intended to support the analytical policy research of open society leaders and to provide these Fellows with professional policy training. Fellows participate in four training seminars in Budapest over the course of the fellowship year conducted by professors of public policy from around the world and gain vital skills including how to write professional policy documents, identify appropriate policy instruments, and effectively advocate policies.

The Congressional Fellowships on Women and Public Policy

The Women's Research and Education Institute (WREI) is an independent, national public policy research and education center whose mission is to inform and help shape the public policy debate on issues affecting women in their roles in the family, the workplace, and the public arena. The WREI Fellowships are designed to train women as potential leaders in public policy formation and to examine issues from the perspective and experiences and needs of women. A WREI Fellow works 30 hours per week in a Congressional office as a legislative aide on policy issues affecting women. Only students who are currently enrolled in a master's or doctoral program at an accredited institution in the United States or who have completed such a program within the past 18 months are eligible. WREI Fellows receive a stipend of approximately \$1,300 per month for eight months of the academic year (January-August). An additional sum of \$500 is provided for the purchase of health insurance. WREI will also reimburse Fellows up to a maximum of \$1,500 (\$750 per semester) for the cost of 3 hours tuition at their home institutions.

The Coro Fellows Program is an intensive nine-month, full-time, graduate-level program. Unconventional by traditional academic standards, the program is rigorous and demanding, and is an unparalleled opportunity for personal and professional growth. Each year, after a rigorous national selection process, sixty-four Coro Fellows are chosen from across the country to serve as Coro Fellows at one of the following Coro Centers: Los Angeles, New York, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and San Francisco.

Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellowship Program

Launched in 1967, the International Affairs Fellowship Program is designed to advance the professional development of outstanding young Americans between the ages of 27 and 35. The fellowships are for individuals from the government, business, professional, and academic communities. The fellowships seek to bridge the gap between thought and action in foreign policy by supporting both a variety of policy studies and active exposure to policymaking. The selection committee welcomes a wide variety of research proposals which focus on the year on the task of looking for solutions to an identified problem in the conduct of American foreign policy. Within a fixed maximum the program will generally try to meet the major portion of the Fellow's current income

Council on Foreign Relations Military Fellowship

Each year, the Chiefs of Staff of the Army and the Air Force, the Chief of Naval Operations, and the Commandant of the Marine Corps nominate an outstanding officer from their respective services as a candidate for a Military Fellowship. The Council usually awards two or three such fellowships annually. The program enables the officers selected to broaden their understanding of foreign relations by spending a year in residence at the Council's headquarters in New York, or, in special circumstances, at the Council offices in Washington, D.C. Fellows participate in Council programs, meet with Council members and staff, and engage in studies in conjunction with the Council's Studies Program. They also assist in arranging several politico-military trips for Council members during the year.

Council on Foreign Relations Next Generation Fellowship

The Next Generation Fellowship Program nurtures outstanding thinkers and writers from a variety of fields who have the potential to become foreign policy leaders. The Program recruits individuals whose principal mission will be frontier policy scholarship, leading to several major published articles or a book during the fellowship tenure. Next Generation Fellows (NGFs) are full members of the Council on Foreign Relations staff, working in residence at the Council's New York or Washington, DC, offices. NGFs are an integral component of the Studies Department staff and have substantial contact with other Fellows, Council members, and experts in their field. Most NGFs are in residence for two or three years. Next Generation Fellowships are open to individuals between the ages of 27 and 40 who have earned a doctorate or some other advanced degree and/or the equivalent experience in government or elsewhere. Although candidates are welcomed from any field within international relations, the Council gives preference to applicants whose work seeks to join regional or functional expertise with economics.

David L. Boren Graduate Fellowships: sponsored by The National Security Education Program (NSEP)

These Fellowships enable U.S. graduate students to pursue specialization in area and language study or to add an international dimension to their education. Boren Fellowships support students pursuing the study of languages, cultures, and world regions that are critical to U.S. national security but are less frequently studied by U.S. graduate students, i.e., areas of the world other than Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. Boren Graduate Fellowships encourage U.S. graduate students to add an international dimension to their curricula. Students already enrolled in internationally oriented programs are encouraged to intensify their study of areas, languages, and cultures. Fellowships provide support for overseas or domestic study, or a combination of both. The maximum award for overseas study is \$10,000 per semester for up to two semesters. A maximum of \$12,000 is available for a program of domestic study only. The maximum level of support for a combined overseas and domestic program is \$28,000.

Democracy Fellows Program

This program is primarily supported by USAID and is intended to develop new field-experienced US experts committed to careers in democracy and governance. Approximately 14 fellowships per year are offered. Fellows receive an annual stipend from \$30,000-50,000, as well as travel expenses, accident/health insurance, and additional allowances. Fellowships are awarded to promote the career development of junior- and mid-level individuals and are not intended for fellows to pursue teaching or research; applicants have zero-ten years of professional experience, and relatively little exposure or experience in the field of international democracy and governance. Applicants must be US citizens and must have a Master's or JD degree. Fellows will be based either in a USAID office overseas, or at the HQ in Washington, DC.

Fascell Fellowship Program

Fellows will serve on a short-term basis at US diplomatic or consular missions in order to obtain first-hand exposure to the culture and potential independent area/language study. Fellowships are intended for, but not necessarily limited to, teachers, scholars, academics, or other individuals currently enrolled in or recently graduated from a graduate level program focused on Eastern European or Slavic languages. Positions generally are as administrative assistants, consular assistants or general service operations assistants. High levels of language proficiency are required. Must be a US citizen, 21 or older, fluent in the language(s) of the country (countries) in which you wish to be considered for an appointment, and currently enrolled, or recently completed, a graduate-level degree focused on language/area studies.

At the same time, the program is designed to enhance the FBI's visibility and recruitment efforts at colleges and universities throughout the United States. Due to the very selective and highly competitive nature of the Honors Internship Program, a limited number of internships are awarded each summer. Only individuals possessing strong academic credentials, outstanding character, a high degree of motivation, and the willingness to represent the FBI upon returning to their respective campus will be selected.

Open to recent graduates of masters' and doctoral programs. Fellows work for two years with the state's highest officials in assignments that require the application of education and training to the real-world challenges of state government. Fellows are assigned to the office of a cabinet secretary or to a state agency's research and analysis unit. Regular seminars and specially arranged activities-such as discussions with state leaders and tours of important state facilities-complement the fellowship experience. Successful applicants are employed on a contractual basis for two years at a salary of \$36,514 per year.

Herbert Scoville Peace Fellowship

This Fellowship was established to provide college graduates with the opportunity to gain a Washington perspective on key issues of peace and security. The United States Department of State is the principal administrator of the Fulbright Program worldwide. The Institute of International Education assists the Department of State in the conduct of the programs. Currently, the U.S. Student Program annually awards approximately 1,000 grants to U.S. citizens to study overseas. In addition, approximately 3,000 non U.S. nationals are currently in the U.S. on a Fulbright Grant. These scholarships are primarily given for university teaching, advanced research, graduate study and teaching in elementary and secondary schools with the purpose of increasing a mutual understanding between US citizens and citizens of other countries.

Joan B. Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies Visiting Fellows Program

The Kroc Institute brings together outstanding scholars to conduct peace-related research, broadly defined. Themes include the peacemaking role of international norms, policies, and institutions; approaches to the study and resolution of violence; and the quest for social, economic, and environmental justice. Fellows conduct research and write in their areas of interest while interacting with Kroc Institute faculty and staff, and with Kroc faculty fellows in the broader Notre Dame community. Visiting fellows host a brown bag talk early in their residence. The Institute furnishes junior fellows with a stipend up to \$20,000 per semester; senior fellows receive up to \$25,000 per semester. Fellows have an office, library access, communications links, and document retrieval services. Housing is provided in furnished Institute apartments at no cost. Publications that result from research or writing conducted at the Kroc Institute should acknowledge the visiting fellows program.

Mexico-North Research Network Transnationalism Fellowship Program

The Mexico-North Research Network announces its 2004 fellowship program to support innovative research on U.S.-Mexican transnationalism and to foster collaboration between U.S. and Mexican scholars on topics related to this theme. Research projects on any aspects of U.S.-Mexican transnationalism will be considered, but the projects must focus on topics that have not been thoroughly explored and must contribute significantly to the advancement of scholarship on transnationalism. Six fellowships will be awarded to graduate students and Ph.D. scholars to conduct research in Mexico between June 1 and August 30, 2005. The program is funded by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the United States Department of State and is open to U.S. citizens only. Fellowship stipends are \$4000 and for the two-month fellowship period. Each fellow will also receive an allowance of \$500 for research-related expenses, including travel within Mexico.

Monbusho (Monbukagakusho) Scholarship for Research Study in Japan

Applications for the Monbusho (Ministry of Education, Science, Sports and Culture) Japanese Government Research Student Scholarship for University of college graduates who wish to pursue

graduate studies at a Japanese university will be available at the Consulate General of Japan in Los Angeles. The scholarships, administered by Monbusho, were established to promote mutual understanding and cooperation between Japan and 110 different countries, including the US. Applicants must be US citizens, under the age of 35 as of September 2000 and university or college graduates. Applicants may choose (1) two years from April 2005 to March 2007 or (2) one and one half years from October 2005 to March 2007. The term of the scholarship will include six months of Japanese language training for those without previous experience. Scholarship benefits include: an allowance of 180,300 yen per month during the term of the scholarship, round-trip tourist class airfare to and from Japan, an allowance of 25,000 yen upon arrival and exempted fees of the entrance examination, matriculation, and tuition for school.

National Flagship Language Initiative Pilot Program – for Arabic, Korean, and Mandarin Chinese

Funded by the National Security Education Program, this program is designed to offer U.S. students an opportunity to gain high levels of language proficiency in languages critical to U.S. national security. Potential applicants must have already achieved advanced language proficiency in one of these languages. NSEP will provide full financial support to enroll in programs administered by one of the participating institutions, including a combination of funding for immersion study abroad and intensive language training. Instructional programs will range from 6 to 18 months. All NSEP scholarship and fellowship recipients incur a federal service requirement as a condition of accepting this award. Currently, NFLI is not accepting application for new Flagship awards. New award information will be posted on the website as it becomes available.

NATO- Manfred Wörner Essay Award (Replaces Manfred Wörner Fellowship)

To honour the memory of Manfred Wörner, the late NATO Secretary General, and in particular the role he played in transforming the Alliance at the end of the Cold War, the NATO Allies agreed in October 2005 to create an annual essay-writing competition with two awards. Starting in 2006, there will be a Junior NATO Manfred Wörner Essay Award and the Senior NATO Manfred Wörner Essay Award. The Junior NATO Manfred Wörner Essay Award is open to academics, researchers and writers from both NATO and Partner countries, aged between 20 and 35. A prize of € 5000 will be awarded to the individual who submits the best essay on a topic of relevance to the Alliance. The essay should not exceed 5000 words and should be suitable for widespread dissemination, including in NATO publications.

New Voices National Fellowship Program

Focuses on international human rights, women's rights, racial justice, migrant and refugee rights, peace and security, foreign policy and international economic policy. New Voices provides two years salary for the fellows working at an organization. Prospective fellows apply for the program jointly with the organization that will host them. Eligible organizations must be US based, and preference is given to nonprofits with an annual budget of two million dollars or less. The grants provide salary support for the fellow, financial assistance to cover student loans or other approved expenses, mentoring, professional leadership training and other supports. The host organization receives free consultation, technical assistance, and, if needed, a computer for the Fellow. The goal of this grant program is to help both the Fellow and the organization achieve their full potential in their field.

OECD Young Professional Program

The aim of this program is to identify young, highly-qualified professional who are interested in working for the Organization and who, after an initial appointment of two years, would have the potential to make a career in the OECD. Designed for young professionals with a Ph.D. or Master's. MA candidates are eligible if they have a minimum of 2-3 years of relevant professional experience. Focus areas include economics, agriculture, environment, science and technology, education, social affairs, trade, finance, and development. Fellows attend committee and working party meetings; assist in monitoring developments in relevant policy areas; draft statistical reports; collect, organize, evaluate, and interpret statistical data; participate in the drafting of proposals and documents for committee and other meetings; supervise assistants and other support staff; and conduct relevant research in areas of interest to OECD. Applicants must be fluent in either English or French, and a working knowledge of another language would be an asset. You must hold citizenship of an OECD member country in order to apply.

Organization of American States Graduate Fellowships Program: *Self-placed fellowships*

The nature of this fellowship mechanism supposes that the candidate seeks admission to the university/college/institution where he/she intends to pursue graduate studies or research. The fundamental objective of the Graduate Fellowship Program is to promote the economic, social, scientific and cultural development of the member States in order to achieve a stronger bond and better understanding among the peoples of the Americas through the advanced training of its citizens in the priority areas requested by the countries. A fellowship cannot be awarded for graduate study or research in the country of origin of the candidate. Self-placed Academic Studies Fellowships may provide funds for university tuition and fees, international travel, health insurance, living expenses, and for the purchase of books or other study materials. These benefits will vary depending on the type of fellowship awarded.

Organization of American States Graduate Fellowships Program: *OAS placed Scholarships*

In the agency-placed program, applicants will indicate the desired field, program and country of study. Applicants will be asked to indicate two or three institutions of preference but will not be required to apply to these institutions for admission. LASPAU will be responsible for seeking admission and securing tuition assistance for selected candidates at an appropriate institution, taking into account stated preferences where feasible. Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowship for New Americans

A *New American* is an individual who (1) is a resident alien; i.e., holds a Green Card, or, (2) has been naturalized as a U.S. citizen, or (3) is the child of two parents who are both naturalized citizens. The Program is open to individuals who retain loyalty and a sense of commitment to their country of origin as well as to the United States, but is intended to support individuals who will continue to regard the United States as their principal residence and focus of national identity. The applicant must either have a bachelor's degree or be in her/his final year of undergraduate study. Those who have a bachelor's degree may already be pursuing graduate study and may receive Fellowship support to continue that study. Individuals who are in the third, or subsequent, year of study in the same graduate program are not, however, eligible for this competition.
