The National Security Education Program (NSEP), created by the US Congress in 1991, addresses the need to increase the ability of Americans to communicate and compete globally by

knowing the languages and cultures of other countries. NSEP embodies a recognition that the scope of national security has expanded to include not only the traditional concerns of protecting and promoting American well-being, but the new challenges of global security, including sustainable development, environmental degradation, global disease and hunger, population growth and migration, and economic competitiveness.

The Monterey Institute is one of the top ranked schools for applications versus awards, and in 2003-2004 was ranked as one of the top three schools.

Each year approximately 300 graduate students are selected to pursue the study of languages and cultures in one of more than 68 countries, emphasizing a diverse range of fields of study, including business, political science, applied sciences, international affairs, engineering, health, law, economics, history and other social sciences. Applicants design their own program, and may combine domestic language and cultural study with the overseas component – for a period not to exceed six semesters. Students, in creating their budget proposal, can be compensated up to \$28,000.

Upon completion of the NSEP program, students agree to work either for a US government agency with national security responsibilities such as the Departments of Commerce, Environment, Defense, Energy, Justice, and State, and the Intelligence Community, as well as more than 25 committees and subcommittees of the US Congress.
